

President's Commentary



It is time for greetings for the "spring issue" of the *Visnyk*. From

our current location in Las Vegas, spring is in fact a reality. The grass is green and being watered, flowers are blooming and the colours of the flowering trees are a sight to behold. Thanks to the advancement of technology, communication via telephone or the internet is instantaneous, making distances disappear. So being "far away" does not mean being out of touch. This publication is reaching you just following our March Board meeting, which will be my final as Chair, and so too this will be my final commentary as Chair. As such one could take some time to review the past three terms. To itemize the events and activities of the past nine years would be a relatively simple but lengthy process. Fortunately, my personal journal is not with me and thus readers are spared what could be a lengthy and perhaps boring dissertation.

The UCC is unique, perhaps unlike any other as an ethnocultural organization. Its origins, evolution, and growth are indeed a fascinating phenomenon. Since 1940, UCC has progressed to be recognized as the unequivocal spokesperson for Canada's Ukrainian community at the national, provincial and local levels. For almost seven decades UCC has continued to serve the Canadian Ukrainian community with distinction, sensitivity, and understanding. In the same context the community expects UCC to provide professional leadership and representation with unbiased integrity, and therein continues to support its growth and development. Indeed in Saskatchewan, UCC originated just days after the national creation, and while it has undergone many changes of direction, the concept continues to be as strong today as it was in the beginning. Notwithstanding the unusual entry of provincial councils such as UCC-SPC, the need and desire for provincial representation speaks for itself. The strength and continued growth of UCC-SPC reflects its adaptation to the ever-changing demographic dynamics of the changing society of Saskatchewan. That strength is also reflective of the leadership of UCC-SPC through its representation of the larger community with Branch chairs sitting at its Board table. This active, integral involvement aims to ensure inclusion without discrimination or differentiation. UCC-SPC must and is always mindful of the fact that it speaks for and on behalf of almost a full 13 percent of the total population of the province of Saskatchewan. To that end there is an obligation of strength in leadership.

It is not my intent to reflect upon my personal involvement within the Ukrainian community, since it is my belief that one doesn't "jump into" any ethnocultural community. Rather one is born into it and such it was in my case. For this, my indebtedness rests with my parents. In the same sense, one doesn't leave their ethnicity by stepping out of an organization. UCC-SPC is the umbrella organization of all the Ukrainian organizations within the province. It has been my privilege to chair this distinguished Board for the past three terms. Through the nearly full decade there have been many noteworthy achievements, many challenges, as well as some disappointments, but at all times we proceeded with confidence into the future. My strong belief is that a Chair must first and foremost be a good listener, and thereafter Board directions evolve through the normal progression of involvement. The UCC-SPC is blessed with the good fortune to have members with strength, integrity, and a demonstrated interest who can, and will step into the Chair. As the outgoing Chair it has indeed not only been a privilege, but also a distinct honour to serve the community that is part of my life. To that end, I express to the community of Saskatchewan my sincerest thank-you for providing me with that privilege.

The Ukrainian community, being a significant cultural entity within Saskatchewan, is not surprisingly a part of the cultural organization, which is now SaskCulture. Saskatchewan is unique in Canada in distributing lottery proceeds. UCC-SPC being a member and therein a recipient of lottery funds is indebted to SaskCulture.

UCC-SPC is not just an organization with a Board of Directors. While the Board does function in a policy mode, the enactment of policy and board decisions is the responsibility of the employed staff. As a provincial cultural organization, we have been very fortunate to attract employees that have a genuine interest in the community they serve, and therein perform far beyond what is defined in their job descriptions. To Danylo and his staff Ihor and Valentyna, my most sincere thank-you is extended for making my task as the Chair an enjoyable experience. My wish is that you continue with confidence, energy, and enthusiasm.

Since the Ukrainian community is steeped in spirituality, and Easter is just around the corner, on behalf of the UCC-SPC Board and Staff, to one and all is extend the traditional Easter greeting:

In the spring of 2003, UCC-SPC hosted a round table community consultation on the topic

of immigration. At that time, the number of immigrants from Ukraine choosing Saskatchewan as their new home was small. The goals of the round table were to: gauge our community's interest in immigration; gain an understanding of existing immigration programs; and finally seek direction for UCC-SPC. In response, UCC-SPC established its Standing Committee on Immigration in early 2004 with representation from various Saskatchewan communities; Evelyn Wojcichowsky was appointed Chair.

Regular readers of *Visnyk* have been able to follow the progress

of the Committee through the Chair's reports. There have been major changes since 2003... what a difference four years make! In addition to the provincial committee, there are branch committees in the Battlefords, Regina and Saskatoon and more to come. From a handful of immigrants in 2003, there are now hundreds of new Ukrainian families settling in Saskatchewan each year. We can confidently say that the doors are open wide to Ukrainian immigrants.

We have been partnering with Saskatchewan businesses who are hiring skilled workers from Ukraine (welders, machinist, carpenters, truck drivers, and so on) not only to identify immigrant settlement needs but also to develop plans to ensure as easy a settlement process as possible for our newest community members.

On 12 March, the Government of Saskatchewan announced nearly 1 million dollars in funding to institutions and organizations across the province that provide immigrant settlement services. The success shown thus far by our Committees, as well as a proven capacity to get things done, contributed to UCC-SPC and its branches in the Battlefords, Regina and Saskatoon receiving sixty thousand dollars as an initial grant to continue settlement efforts, including English as a Second Language classes. UCC-SPC congratulates Minister Pat Atkinson and the Saskatchewan Government on this important and long-awaited announcement. The Ukrainian community is pleased to be in partnership with the Government to build a better Saskatchewan.

I am also pleased to announce that the UCC-SPC Annual General Meeting and Board Elections will take place on Saturday 12 May in Saskatoon. The meeting will be held in conjunction with a provincial conference, part of which will focus on Immigration. Please check our website (WWW.UCC.Sk.Ca) for details or contact us at 1.888.652.5850.

As this is an Annual General Meeting, all UCC-SPC member organisations are encouraged to send a representative to the meeting as you are entitled to vote at the elections to the UCC-SPC

Board. Remember, the AGM is your opportunity to have your say about the direction and activities of the UCC-SPC. For those interested in running for the provincial Board, nomination information will be made available on our website.

In closing, on behalf of the staff of UCC-SPC, I extend greetings for a most blessed and happy Easter celebration. Easter is the celebration of the victory of life over death and, as such, challenges us to forget about all that is bad and evil so that tomorrow will begin with a good heart and clear conscience.

Icon Painting Workshop in Regina

Approximately 30 Grade 5 & 6 students of the Regina Catholic Schools' Ukrainian Program were thrilled to take part in an icon painting workshop instructed by local artist Vasyl Stratiychuk. The project took place on the afternoons of January 23 and 24, 2007 at Miller High School in the classroom and was supervised by teacher Katerina Oleski.

Vasylis well-known throughout the Ukrainian community for his artistic abilities. He worked as a professor of painting techniques and restoration at the Artistic Academy of Ukraine, having restored more than 100 artistic works, paintings and icons for various museums throughout Ukraine. He has participated in many national and international displays in Canada, Finland and Japan. Since moving to Canada, Vasyl has crafted the carving of entrance doors, baptismal font and candle holders for the Church of All Saints in Saskatoon. He created an iconostas for St. Andrew's College in Winnipeg and the Chapel at Selo Gardens in Regina and continues to paint icons and create wood carvings from his workshop in Regina.

With Vasyl's expert instruction, the students were instructed on how to paint an icon of *Cenmuŭ Μυκοπαŭ* (St. Nicholas), including how to mix the paints and where to paint on the icon. He also helped the students to touch up their work, making the icons look even better. The students were amazed by Vasyl's skill and talent and were proud


of their own work, which turned out beautifully.

Immigration:

It's About Investing in Saskatchewan's Future

Governments at all levels are making efforts to attract more and younger economic immigrants to alleviate existing labour shortages, provide for a smooth labour turnover once the baby-boom generation starts to retire, and promote investment and entrepreneurship that will ensure long-term economic growth. These efforts come at a critical time when the labour force is aging and governments anticipate pressures on publicly funded programs. Given the projected labour shortages and the strong competition for skilled workers from other countries,

an aggressive policy to attract immigrants is necessary.

An October 2003 study by Janice Stokes of the Saskatchewan Institute of Public Policy noted that Saskatchewan demographics are growing polarized between an older non-Aboriginal population and a younger Aboriginal population, primarily due to out-migration. Largescale retirement of the babyboomer generation is anticipated to create workforce shortages in the near future.

The province has a growing Aboriginal population that could aid in workforce replacement,

but Aboriginal labour force participation and educational attainment rates are low, and Saskatchewan average educational attainment levels are generally below the national averages.

Despite troubling demographic trends, Stokes concluded, "opportunities exist, however, for the province to attempt to steer away from a demographic-engendered crisis."1

Other studies have stressed the need to increase immigration as a way to deal with these challeng-

ing demographic realities. In a 1998 research paper titled "Just Numbers: Demographic Change and Immigration in Canada's Future," David Baxter wrote: "Not only is immigration good for Canada's demography, it is good for Canada's economy: it increases the economic welfare of resident Canadians, creates employment, and makes Canada more economically competitive. Immigration—like education is about investing in our future. It provides us with the opportunity to maintain the benefits of our social services system as our population ages without plac-

"Meet and Greet" for Ukrainian skilled workers



On December 17, 2006 Oberih Social Services held a social for the new Ukrainian immigrants who arrived in Saskatoon over the past year. This event was held at St. George's Senior Citizen's Hall.

Oberih had many requests from the newcomers to facilitate a gathering where families could meet and become acquainted. Many Ukrainian families have arrived over the past months but they have not had the opportunity to

meet each other. Some of these workers went to the same technical school or were in orientations in Kyiv together before coming to Canada, however, since arriving have not had an opportunity to meet each other.

ing an unsustainable load on Canada's working population. It gives the opportunity to have the economic expansion that will be required to support us in the fashion we are accustomed to when we are the elderly."2

The UCC-SPC has long supported enhanced Saskatchewan immigration opportunities and has, over the years, worked with the Government of Saskatchewan to expand means for Ukrainians to settle here.

UCC-SPC welcomed the introduction and subsequent expansion of the Saskatchewan Immigrant Nominee Program (SINP). This program, which operates under an agreement with the federal government, provides an alternate and quicker means of entry into Canada. Under SINP, qualified applicants are nominated by the Saskatchewan government for landed immigrant status under criteria established by the province. Individuals interested in immigrating to Saskatchewan or finding out more about the program can visit www.immigrationsask.gov.sk.ca.

Saskatchewan's Growing **Immigrant Population**

SINP issued 1,027 nominations in 2006, which exceeded the year's target by more than 200. Compared to the 401 nominations issued in 2005, this represents an increase of 150 per cent.

For each nomination certificate, there is one principal applicant and, on average, two accompanying family members (spouse and child), potentially resulting in 3,000 new residents en route to Saskatchewan.

Saskatchewan Minister Responsible for Immigration, Pat Atkinson said, "Inviting people from around the world to build their futures here in Saskatchewan will foster our economy's growth into the future and make life better for everyone, including new immigrants. We are well ahead of schedule to achieve our goal of welcoming 5,000 newcomers by 2008."

The increase in SINP nominations can be attributed in part to recent expansions of the program. The Family Members Category (created in December 2005) now accounts for more than one-half of the applications. This category enables Saskatchewan residents to support family members living abroad who want to live and work in Saskatchewan.

As Canadians, we take pride in our immigrant population and heritage, which have contributed not only to a prosperous and diversified economy, but also to a colourful mosaic of cultures, traditions, and values. Immigration continues to provide many skilled workers, entrepreneurs, and business people from foreign countries with the opportunity to apply their knowledge, expertise and experience in Canada. It has also enabled families to re-unite and refugees to find a safe haven from persecution and torture.

Ukrainian Community Tackles Settlement

UCC-SPC has been very active over the past four years in developing settlement services for the quickly expanding number of immigrants from Ukraine making Saskatchewan their home as well as the businesses hiring them.

On 12 March, the Minister Responsible for Immigration, Pat Atkinson announced \$977,000 in one-time development funding for settlement service providers and institutions. The UCC-SPC and its branches in the Battlefords, Regina and Saskatoon will receive \$60,000 of this. These

funds will be used to undertake a number of settlement projects identified as high-priority. They allow relevant groups to initiate settlement projects while preparing for longer-term funding to be made available from the newly established Community Capacity Building Fund.

These new grant opportunities are an acknowledgement by the Government of Saskatchewan of the support and efforts of the Ukrainian community in meeting settlement service needs.

Projects to be funded through the one-time grant include:

- Publication of a Ukrainian translation of the Saskatchewan Driver's Handbook
- Development and Publishing of a Prince Albert & District Settlement Handbook
- Updating of the Regina Settlement Handbook
- · Saskatoon Settlement Co-ordinator
- Saskatoon Office and Storage space
- Development and initiation of English as a Second Language (ESL) course for Saskatoon
- Basic ESL Resources and Community Welcome in the Battlefords



SIAST develops program to assess foreign credentials of skilled workers

New program would match immigrant tradespeople with employer needs

The Saskatchewan Institute of Applied Science and Technology has launched an initiative designed to match the foreign credentials of skilled tradespeople with Saskatchewan employer requirements—while the potential immigrants are still living in their home countries.

SIAST is conducting a feasibility study into the viability of assessing the credentials of applicants to the Saskatchewan Immigrant Nominee Program and Citizenship and Immigration Canada.

"The program would leverage both our expertise in prior learning assessment and recognition (PLAR) and our partnerships with international training institutions," says David Harvey, director of Business Development and International Partnership.

"It would provide cost-effective credential assessment in areas where employers are experiencing critically high demand," Harvey says. The program would also support the Saskatchewan government's goal, announced just over a year ago, of bringing 5,000 immigrants into the province by 2008, he adds.

SIAST has been a pioneer in the development of prior learning assessment, now offering PLAR services for almost 800 courses in more than 90 SIAST programs. As well, the organization has been active overseas, helping developing countries establish employer-driven training facilities for 20 years.

Through a foreign credential recognition program, SIAST

would collaborate with partner institutions internationally to assess immigration applicants with respect to Canadian and Saskatchewan labour market demands. The short list of countries where this may take place includes Ukraine, the Balkans, South Africa, Korea and the Philippines. Initially, the project would likely focus on such trades vocations as welder, machinist, heavy duty mechanic and pipefitter.

Human Resources and Social Development Canada is contributing almost \$300,000 to the cost of the feasibility study, which should be complete by June. This program's development would take place with the guidance of a project steering committee that will include representation from such stakeholders as Saskatchewan Immigration, the Saskatchewan Apprenticeship and Trade Certification Commission, economic development agencies and employers.

SIAST is Saskatchewan's primary public institution for postsecondary technical education and skills training, recognized nationally and internationally for its expertise and innovation. More than 12,000 students are registered in SIAST programs, which touch every sector of the economy; additionally, the organization draws more than 28,000 individual course registrations. It operates campuses in Moose Jaw, Prince Albert, Regina and Saskatoon, and provides a number of courses and programs through distance education. B



Tackling challenges in Ukraine's agriculture sector

The joint Canada-Ukraine FARM (Facility for Agricultural Reform and Modernization) Program was launched in March 2003 to support the reform of Ukraine's agricultural sector and facilitate trade and investment links between Canada and Ukraine. This 5-year initiative is the biggest and the most comprehensive agricultural project funded by the Canadian International Development Agency in Ukraine. The FARM Program is managed by the Saskatchewan Trade and Export Partnership, in partnership with the provinces of Alberta, Manitoba, and Saskatchewan, the Ukrainian Ministry of Agrarian Policy, Ukrainian Academy of Agrarian Sciences, National Agricultural University of Ukraine and the Rivne, Sumy, Volyn and Dnipropetrovsk oblast administrations.

The FARM Program currently supports four oblast and fifteen district extension offices in the Volyn, Rivne, Dnipropetrovsk and Sumy oblasts. The extension

offices employ approximately fifty local agriculture specialists who offer assistance to producers through farm demonstra-

tions, one-on-one consultations, seminars, workshops and other learning events. These specialists have received, and continue to receive leading-edge and extensive training that blends Canadian best practices within the Ukrainian framework. A number of provincial specialists from Alberta, Manitoba and Saskatchewan have been instrumental delivering these trainings, providing both learning and professional development opportunities for both the Canadians and Ukrainians involved. To date, the FARM extension offices have

> provided services to approximately 15,000 rural dwellers.

In addition to providing extension services, the

FARM Program provides resources to Ukrainian and Canadian organizations to fund projects designed to tackle a variety of issues and challenges within Ukraine's agriculture sector. To date the FARM Program has funded over 26 projects with an additional four projects in the pipeline. The projects have covered topics such the introduction

ofleafcutter beetechnology, community pasture development, organic farming, co-operative development and a host of others. Moreover, a number of Saskatchewan companies and organizations that have participated in the grant fund program include: Koenders mfg., the University of Saskatchewan, OCIA International, FarmPure Global, and Canada-Ukraine Agrarian Development Inc. These organizations have made an invaluable contribution to Ukraine's agriculture sector and we hope that the partnerships forged under these projects will continue to provide mutual benefit long after the support provided by FARM ends.

Federal Government establishes eligibility for Children's Fitness Tax Credit: parents of children enrolled in Ukrainian dance qualify for \$500 credit

On December 19, 2006 the Honourable Jim Flaherty, Minister of Finance, released guidelines on the Children's Fitness Tax Credit, which came into effect on January 1, 2007.

The Minister confirmed that, as recommended by the Expert Panel for the Children's Fitness Tax Credit, the definition of eligible programs will support children's participation in all programs that significantly contribute to their fitness.

In addition, the Minister indicated that substantial additional support would be provided to children eligible for the disability tax credit to recognize the unique barriers they face in becoming more active.

"Studies show that regular physical activity has many positive effects on children, including balanced growth and development and improved physical fitness," said Minister Flaherty. "This measure will help parents offset some of the costs associated with these activities and start children down the road to a lifetime of healthy, active living."

Minister Flaherty noted that

he would soon introduce regulatory changes that would define an eligible program for the purposes of the credit and amendments to the Income Tax Act to implement the proposed enhancements for children with disabilities.

"We know that families have limited budgets, and the Children's Fitness Tax Credit will help make it possible for more young Canadians to get involved in sport and physical activity," said the Honourable Peter Van Loan, President of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada, Minister of Intergovernmental Affairs, and Minister for Sport. "I am pleased that we are delivering on this important commitment for families and taxpayers." **B**

Educational ties with Ukraine PART III

Refining cooperation – Youth for Health Project

Between 1998 and 2002 Saskatchewan Education participated in the "Youth for Health" Canada-Ukraine Project, whose goal was to assist Ukraine in developing and implementing youth health promotion policies.

The project involved 8 separate activities to meet project aims and involved many Ukrainian and Canadian institutions. Some of the Ukrainian partners included the Ministry of Education, Ministry of Health, Institute for Social Research (UISR), Academy of Medical Sciences, Kharkiv Children's Institute (ICTHC) and the Kyiv city government. Canadian partners included Health Canada, Government of Saskatchewan, Saskatchewan

Education, Universities of Saskatchewan, Toronto and Victoria and the city of Toronto. Canadian Society for International Health funded all project costs through a grant from the Canadian International Development Agency. Saskatchewan contributed the equivalent of two years of salary for a co-ordinator/manager.

Saskatchewan Education, together with Ukraine's Ministry of Education, were responsible for the development and field testing of a health education curriculum and materials for grades 1-11 students. Saskatchewan also assisted UISR, ICTHC and the University of Saskatchewan in an ongoing assessment of the effectiveness of the health education curriculum and resources.

Programs, instructional and learning materials

The Health (*Valeology*) Program was developed according to the themes most vital to the project. Themes included physical development, healthy nutrition, psychological aspects of health, prevention of drug dependency (tobacco, alcohol, narcotics), safe sexual behaviour and prevention of diseases (HIV/AIDS), and healthy lifestyles.

Over the life of the project three types of Health curricula were developed and eighteen different workbooks, manuals and handbooks were published comprising 2,323 pages of original material. This included workbooks and informational modules for grades 1-4 and grades 5-11 students, teacher manuals for grades 1-4, grades 5-9 and grades 10-11 Health teachers, manuals for methods consultants and for educational administrators and Handbooks for Parents with children at the grades 1-4, 5-9 and 10-11 levels. The total number of documents distributed was 42,350.

A close professional relationship developed between Saskatchewan and Ukrainian educators over the years, creating a high level of mutual trust. This enabled us to introduce a number of educational concepts and approaches into the project which were new to Ukrainian education.

Innovative approaches we introduced:

■ A new educational paradigm

This paradigm favours a balance between content and process, is child-centered, supports a cooperative and safe educational environment and encourages empowerment of learners. It stimulates active learning by encouraging the use of interactive teaching techniques and strategies. These components of the new educational paradigm were incorporated into each and every workbook, manual and handbook developed in the project; they represent an invaluable contribution to the project from Saskatchewan educators!

- Decision-making process Making informed decisions is a part of daily living for everybody. Saskatchewan schools incorporate a decision-making process into instructional materials, teaching and evaluation strategies. This decision-making process was utilized in the development of the teaching and learning materials for students, teachers, consultants and principals in the project!
- **■** Educational administration The new paradigm also calls for a number of administrative changes, including a shift towards decentralized administration, greater school autonomy, collegial not hierarchical structures, and greater parental involvement. In this project the curriculum development team created administrator handbooks—a first for Ukraine's education system! The handbooks devoted chapters to many of these issues, including school effectiveness and effective leadership.
- Parental involvement Saskatchewan's education system believes that a partnership between the parents, educators and community is the key to children's success in school. In this project, three Handbooks for Parents were developed, representing another first for Ukraine! The handbooks informed parents about the experimental Health program their children were involved in and encouraged their active participation and support. UNICEF in Ukraine supported this innovation by facilitating the printing of 34,000 parent handbooks.
- Evaluation of program, materials and implementation An exhaustive formative evaluation of the program, its materials and the effectiveness of their implementation occurred throughout the project. This enabled writers to incorporate revisions during development. Every workbook, manual and handbook was reviewed by Ukrainian Minis-

try of Education specialists and by an independent Canadian curriculum expert. Researchers from UISR and ICTHC conducted quantitative and qualitative assessments, while a combined Ukrainian and Canadian team of education/health experts visited pilot schools, interviewed students, teachers and principals. Every evaluation was positive and stressed the need to continue this type of work.

■ Implementation workshops During the project the writing teams planned and conducted implementation workshops with each of the target groupsteachers, administrators and methods consultants of the Central Institute for Post-Graduate Pedagogical Education. One included principals from 25 oblasts of Ukraine. In total, 10 workshops took place (1999-2001), involving about 400 participants.

Workshops for parents of the 8,000 Kyiv students were particularly innovative! Saskatchewan educators developed a workshop model and prepared a team of teachers from each school to conduct workshops for their parents. Eventually workshops for parents occurred at each school and Parent Handbooks were distributed.

Special accomplishments

In recognition of their high level of satisfaction with our joint work, the Ministry of Education of Ukraine introduced a new subject, "Fundamentals of Health", as a compulsory component in grades 1-9 of their educational programming!

In addition, we in Saskatchewan are particularly pleased to note that the grade 1 Health program developed by our joint writing teams was recommendedby the Collegium of the Ukrainian Ministry of Education — for use in all Ukrainian schools!


