Reports were presented by all member organizations, as well as by Youth Engagement, Resolutions, Education and Culture, Finance and Nominations Committees. There were also presentations and discussions about Ukrainian Ridna Shkolas, Credit Unions and Co-Ops.

President's Commentary

As we reflect on 2018, we are proud of all UCC Saskatchewan has accomplished and the opportunities it has provided for Ukrainians in our province.

With the success of our Nation Builders and Community Recognition Awards held in Prince Albert on November 4, I commend the organizing committee and recognitions committee for working with the UCC Saskatchewan staff to create a memorable event for our recipients and congratulate them on a job well done! As a Ukrainian community, we are so proud of the initiatives and the work being done not only in our province, but also across the nation by our Saskatchewan Ukrainians.

This fall, our UCC Saskatchewan Board worked diligently to create a five-year strategic plan that will take us into 2024. We have successfully created a document which defines our vision, our mission and mandated goals, which will act as a guide and help us "contribute to Saskatchewan's diversity by fully participating in the community and cultural sectors of the province" (Mandated Objectives/Goals, point #6).

The Ukrainian World Congress (UWC) held its XI congress in Kyiv on November 24-27, 2018 with the participation of 248 representing 26 countries. As a Ukrainian Canadian Congress delegate to the UWC, it was an excellent opportunity to meet and network with many of our Ukrainian counterparts from across not only North America but the world.

Under the theme of "Strengthening Ukrainian Statehood for a Brighter Future!" (in view of the threat to and actions of the Russian Federation on Ukraine and the rest of the world), the Congress acted as a tool to assess the activities of the past five-year term of the UWC, develop a plan for the future, and set a direction moving forward for the organization.

A bit of history on this incredible organization for our members here in Saskatchewan: Founded in 1967, the UWC "was recognized in 2003 by the United Nations Economic and Social Council as a non-governmental organization with special consultative status and obtained 2018 participatory status as an international non-governmental organization with the Council of Europe." UWC represents the interests of over 20 million Ukrainians worldwide, with ties in over 61 countries. This organization acts as a conduit to represent Ukrainian people throughout the world, fostering and supporting an international network of member organizations.

In conjunction with and prior to the XI UWC

Congress, the International Forum "Ukraine Remembers, the World Acknowledges" commemorating the 85th Anniversary of the Holodomor



of 1932-1933 – Genocide of the Ukrainian People was held in Kyiv. It was a unique opportunity to take part in this international form, the memorial session at the Verkhovna Rada of Ukraine and the official commemorations in memory of the victims of the Holodomor, which defined the magnitude of this atrocity against humanity.

It was interesting to note the number of speakers and presenters who were from Canada and the evidence-based information provided. Nadia Prokopchuk, an educator from Saskatoon, who is a member of our Holodomor Awareness and Education Committee and was instrumental in the "Voices Into Action" project, also attended the International Forum, along with notable representation from the Canadian Museum for Human Rights in Winnipeg.

As the Holodomor forum came to a close, the official opening of the UWC Congress took place at the Olympiyskyi Sport Complex on November 25. Opening remarks by distinguished guests included President of Ukraine Petro Poroshenko, First Vice Prime Minister of Ukraine Stepan Kubiv, Vice Prime Minister Ivanna Klympush-Tsintsadze, and Minister of Foreign Affairs Pavlo Klimkin.

In his remarks, UWC President (2008-2018) Eugene Czolij noted, "During this period, the Ukrainian World Congress did everything possible to further the European and Euro-Atlantic course of Ukraine. This included the signing and ratification of the EU-Ukraine Association Agreement and providing Ukrainian citizens with a visa-free regime for Schengen-zone states."

Key topics of discussion at the Congress revolved around international support for Ukraine on issues related to economic development, defence, reforms, and humanitarian aid. During the sessions, much emphasis was placed on the role of the diaspora and furthering the positive image of Ukraine and Ukrainians around the world by growing and strengthening the UWC network of organizations.

During the plenary session "UWC in 2025 – development of strategies for effective growth," it was duly brought forward and noted that strengthening of the Ukrainian community and increasing political influence must be one of the focuses of

the organization. In their appeals, speakers called upon community representatives for a more harmonious and coordinated approach to common challenges that are being faced by Ukraine and reminded the participants that all Ukrainians, regardless of their country of residence, can act as one."

As part of the UWC deliberations, regional roundtables were dedicated to the development of Ukrainian communities around the world—Eastern Europe, Western Europe, Australia, Oceania, Asia and Africa, North America, South America and the Russian Federation.

I was part of the North America panel and had the opportunity to share our success in Saskatchewan as an organization that contributes to both the Ukrainian community and to the landscape of our province. The positive and forthcoming comments from our youth panellists were very encouraging and definitely spoke to the future leadership of our Ukrainian organizations.

In response to the escalation of the recent military aggression of the Russian Federation, the result of an attack on November 25 on Ukrainian navy ships in the Kerch Strait, the UWC made an appeal to the international community that was unanimously supported by Congress delegates.

As a group of over 80 Canadian dele-

gates, we were given the opportunity to meet with Ambassador Roman Waschuk, Canada's Ambassador to Ukraine, and the Honorary Consul Oksana Wynnyckyj-Yusypovych. They reiterated the progress of reforms in Ukraine, the valuable role Canada plays in supporting Ukraine (i.e., Operation Unifier) and the continued pressure Canadians need to exert to help Ukraine fight against Putin's aggression.

With the conclusion of Congress, as Canadians we were very honoured and proud to see our UCC National President, Paul Grod, be elected the Ukrainian World Congress President to lead the new Board. With much gratitude, we congratulate Eugene Czolij, also a Canadian, on a job well done for the past two terms leading the UWC.

Attending this conference gave me a broader perspective on the achievements of the UWC, its influence and how important it is for as Ukrainians around the world to be diligent and support issues that directly or indirectly affect the democracy of the civil society.

As the Chair of an outstanding UCC Saskatchewan Board of Directors, I would like to thank these colleagues, and an equally dedicated UCC staff, for their dedication and encompassing interest in making the Ukrainian Canadian com-

Ukraine Remembers, the World Acknowledges

Highlights of the 85th International Holodomor Forum in Kyiv, Ukraine

In fall of 2018, the Embassy of Ukraine in Canada invited UCC national and provincial representatives to take part in the International Holodomor Forum planned for November 22-24, 2018 in Kyiv, Ukraine. This Forum marked the 85th anniversary of the mass genocide called Holodomor, an artificial famine strategically planned and executed by Joseph Stalin to starve millions of Ukrainians in 1932-33. As a member of UCC Saskatchewan's Holodomor Awareness and Education Committee, it was truly an honour to be invited to attend this commemorative event. UCC Provincial President Mary Ann Trischuk was also in attendance.

The International Forum opened on November 22nd with an official welcome from Ukraine's First Vice Prime Minister, Stepan Kubiv, followed by introductory comments from Volodymyr Viatrovych, Director of the Ukrainian Institute of National Remembrance. Both speakers underscored the fact that the Holodomor was a cruel, inhumane plan to destroy the

Ukrainian people—their patriotic spirit, language, culture, and faith—so that they could no longer rise up in opposition to Stalin's totalitarian regime and forced collectivization. The formal opening concluded with a poetry reading by poet laureate, Ivan Malkovych, whose statement "Попіл мертвих стукається у наших грудях" set a solemn tone for the Forum and reminded all participants that "The ashes of the dead beat within our chests."

Nine panel sessions took place over a two-day span, covering a range of topics which included:

 a debate on Raphael Lemkin's writing* and the United Nations definition of genocide;

- an overview of institutional research to date conducted in Canada, USA, and Ukraine;
- advances in academic research using authentic sources;
- progress on mapping the numbers of victims, using archival evidence from Ukrainian oblasts affected by the Holodomor;
- museum spaces in Canada and Ukraine that honour victims of genocide;
- the critical role of film and media in telling the story of the Holodomor; and,
- new publications that support education about the Holodomor both within and outside Ukraine.

* Raphael Lemkin (1900-1959) was an expert in international criminal law who coined the term "genocide". Many of his ideas were incorporated into the United Nations Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of Genocide in 1948. Lemkin was the first to declare that the Holodomor was a genocide against the entire Ukrainian nation, not just Ukrainian farmers, by Joseph Stalin through a four-pronged approach: 1) decimation of Ukraine's national elites; 2) destruction of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church; 3) starvation of the Ukrainian farming population; and, d) strategic resettlement of villages by non-Ukrainians from Russia and elsewhere.



It was gratifying to see that Canadian historians, researchers, educators, and community activists were well-represented in most panel presentations. Canadian presenters were: Roman Serbyn, Professor Emeritus, University of Quebec; Bohdan Klid, Valentina Kuryliw, and Marta Baziuk, representing the Holodomor Research and Education Consortium (HREC); Frank Sysyn, Historian, Canadian Institute of Ukrainian Studies (CIUS); Valentina Noseworthy, Consultant, Manitoba Ministry of Education; Lubomyr Luciuk, Professor, Royal Military College; Bohdan Onyschuk, Chair, Holodomor National Awareness Tour/Mobile Classroom; and John Young, Director of the Canadian Museum for Human Rights.

A requiem concert was held at the National Opera House on the evening of Friday, November 23rd in tribute to the victims of the Holodomor. The Forum concluded with an Official Commemoration in Memory of the Victims of the

Holodomor held at the Holodomor Victims Memorial National Museum on the afternoon of Sunday, November 24th. This commemorative event was attended by foreign dignitaries and International Forum participants. The afternoon began with a patriotic, impassioned speech by Ukraine's President, Petro Poroshenko. He clearly aligned the tragic events of 1932-33 with current Russian aggression in Ukraine, ending with his campaign slogan "Геть від Москви! Away from Moscow!". The President's address was followed by compassionate greetings from European dignitaries and the USA. Each of the speakers expressed sorrow for the tragic loss of life on Ukrainian territory during the Holodomor.

At 3:30 pm, all guests at the Official Commemoration took part in a procession to the Holodomor Victims' Memorial on the bank of the Dnipro River. Following a *Panakhyda* Memorial Service by members of the clergy, President Poroshenko delivered another moving address to mark the 85th Anniversary of the Holodomor. All people present lit candles and observed a minute of silence at 4:00 pm, Kyiv time. The candles were placed around the memorial site in memory of those who perished.

The candle-lighting ceremony in Ukraine marked the end of the Ukrainian World Congress initiative "Light a candle of remembrance!" which began on September 1, 2018. For 85 days, a candle was lit in different parts of the world uniting Ukrainians and supporters of Ukraine in remembrance of the victims of starvation

during the Holodomor. The UWC initiative also raised awareness of the continuing struggle for human rights, respect, tolerance and dignity.





Remembering the Victims of the Holodomor

Provincial Commemoration held in Saskatchewan Legislative Building



(UCC Saskatchewan) — This year marks the 85th anniversary of the Holodomor, the man-made famine of 1932-1933 during which millions of Ukrainians were deliberately starved to death in a campaign of terror orchestrated by Soviet dictator Joseph Stalin.

In November of each year, people worldwide honour the victims of this crime against humanity. As part of International Holodomor Remembrance Week (November 19-25, 2018), Saskatchewan's provincial commemoration of the Holodomor Ukrainian Famine-Genocide took place November 20 starting at noon in the Rotunda of the Saskatchewan Legislative Building in Regina.

Over 200 guests were in attendance including: Saskatchewan Premier Scott Moe; Minister Responsible for Saskatchewan-Ukraine Relations Greg Ottenbreit; Leader of the Official Opposition Ryan Meili and fellow Members of the Legislative Assembly; and, Regina Mayor Michael Fougere.

The provincial commemoration opened with welcoming remarks by Saskatchewan-Ukraine Relations Advisory Committee Chair Gerald Luciuk, who provided background information on the Holodomor, which in Ukrainian means "extermination by hunger."





Students of the Regina Catholic School Division Ukrainian Program, under the direction of Oksana Zwarych, then sang the national anthems of Canada and Ukraine. This was followed by the choral piece "Beneath Your Compassion" ("Під Твою милість"), sung by members of Regina's Descent of the Holy Spirit Ukrainian Orthodox Church (Sobor) Choir and St. Basil's Ukrainian Catholic Church under the direction of Vera Feduschak.

Addresses were provided by Hon. Greg Ottenbreit and Ukrainian Canadian Congress of Saskatchewan Vice-President John Denysek.

Minister Ottenbriet noted that the Province of Saskatchewan was the first jurisdiction in North America to recognize the manmade famine that devastated Ukraine during the early 1930s.

"Eighteen countries, including Canada, have recognized Holodomor as genocide against the Ukrainian people," said Minister Ottenbreit. "Now that we know, we must tell the story, learn from the dark chapters in human history to ensure that such crimes against humanity are never allowed to be repeated."

"Because we, as Canadians, aspire to have a just and civil society, it is important that we continue to demonstrate this to the world," said Denysek.

On behalf of UCC Saskatchewan, he thanked the premier and government of the day, both in government and in opposition, for its unanimous decision in 2008 to pass Bill 40, recognizing the Holodomor as an act of genocide.

"Today's service continues to demonstrate our commitment to our values of justice and civility to the world," said Denysek. "May our efforts help to bring peace to the souls of those who lost their lives 85 years ago by ensuring the Holodomor story, a story of great human suffering and injustice, is learned, shared, reflected upon, to remind us that this should never happen again."

The bilingual memorial service was led by Rev. Fr. Patrick Powalinsky (Ukrainian Orthodox Church of Canada), Rev. Fr. Vasyl Tymishak (St. Athanasius Ukrainian Catholic Church, Regina), Rev. Fr. Vladimir Simunovic (Ukrainian Catholic Parish of St. Basil the Great, Regina), and Rev. Fr. Vitaliy Ihnativ (St. Michael's Ukrainian Orthodox Church, Regina). Afterwards, Hon. Greg Ottenbreit, John Denysek, and students Cassidy Lamb (Regina) and Dawson Puderak (Saskatoon) lit the memorial candle, which remained lit in the

Rotunda for the remainder of Holodomor Memorial Week to show solidarity with those around the world marking the Holodomor.

Following a moment of silence, the members of the Descent of the Holy Spirit Ukrainian Orthodox Church (Sobor) Choir and St. Basil's Ukrainian Catholic Church performed the choral piece "O God, Almighty and Only" ("Боже великий, єдиний").

At the conclusion of the commemoration service, guests made their way to the Holodomor statue, Bitter Memories of Childhood, in Wascana Park to lay wreaths and flowers.

Bishop Filevich School Students Join Global Initiative Commemorating Holodomor





It took place 85 years ago. *It* is the Stalin regime's forcible confiscation of all grain and food stores, including seeds, in Ukraine. *It* caused the death of millions of Ukrainians. *It* is a genocide that is loosely translated as death by starvation. *It* is the Holodomor.

On September 24, students at Bishop Filevich Ukrainian Bilingual School in Saskatoon joined millions of people to commemorate the 85th anniversary of the Holodomor by lighting a candle of remembrance.

The Ukrainian World Congress and other partners lit a remembrance flame in Kyiv, Ukraine, on September 1, typically the first day of school in Ukraine. The flame will make an 85-day journey

across five continents to raise awareness and remember the millions of lives lost. Bishop Filevich was one stop during a three-day tour in Saskatoon. During the commemoration, the names of 85 children who died in the Holodomor were read to remember those who did not return to school in 1933.

"For our school community, this is much more than learning about world history or being good global citizens or even basic curriculum," said Shelly Lord, principal at the province's only Ukrainian bilingual school.

"This is deeply personal for our students, our staff and our parents. Many people in our community came from Ukraine, and their families have been directly affected by the tragedy of the Holodomor."

The 85-day commemoration will conclude on November 24 in conjunction with the Ukrainian national commemoration of the 85th anniversary of the Holodomor in Kyiv.

U of S Students Promote Genocide Awareness

Members of the University of Saskatchewan Ukrainian Students Association in Saskatoon marked Holomodor Awareness Week with several activities on campus.

On November 18th they held a Wheat Sheaf Making and Distributing event in the STM Student Lounge. November 21st saw USUSA members creating awareness in the Arts Tunnel with their "Holodomor-in-a-Box" interactive learning experience. A vigil commemorating Holomodor victims was planned for November 22nd in the St. Thomas More Chapel.

Each event was designed to bring awareness and education on the topic of the Holodomor, a genocide of the Ukrainian people which occurred between 1932 and 1933 and was caused by the leaders of the Soviet Union. Millions of families were starved and murdered.

The state kept information about the genocide hidden, and any family in Ukraine that spoke of it to media or anyone was imprisoned, deported or murdered. The USUSA invites the community to learn about what happened during this dark period in Ukraine.

Інтеграція українців нової хвилі

Переважна більшість публікацій рубрики «Речі, про які варто знати» відповідають на проблемні питання, які виникають у новоприбулих в процесі адаптації у новій країні. Але сьогодні ми розглянемо цю тему під іншим кутом і поговоримо про те, як українці нової хвилі інтегруються у Канаді. На їх прикладі спробуємо знайти відповідь на питання про те, що допомагає новоприбулим у процесі інтеграції. У цій статті ми поділимося історіями успіху українських іммігрантів. Гадаємо, що багато з вас особисто знайомі з людьми про яких йтиме мова і сподіваємося, що це додасть вам наснаги і допоможе провести паралелі зі своїм процесом поселення.

■ Андрея Карнаух іммігрувала до Канади разом із сім'єю у 2006 році. Родом із Закарпаття, Андрея навчалася у Львівській державній консерваторії (тепер академії) ім. М. Лисенка на кафедрі хорового та оперно-симфонічного диригування, де і познайомилася із своїм чоловіком Миколою, також чудовим музикантом та співаком.

«Перші два роки були складними, — згадує Андрея, — двоє дітей, самотність, не знання мови... Отже, спочатку зосередилася на

вивченні англійської. Микола працював, а я брала із собою, на той час маленьких, Данила та Дениса і йшла на мовні курси при Saskatoon Open Door Society. Моїх дітей там доглядали, поки я була в класі. Потім отримала роботу. Спочатку при провінційній раді Конгресу Українців Канади, а потім в українській двомовній школі ім. Владики Філевича та Georges Vanier Catholic Fine Arts School у Саскатуні». Андрея є засновником та керівником дитячого хору «Співограй», а також засновником квартету української духовної музики барокового періоду Oremus (в перекладі з латинської — noмолимось), де співає разом із Миколою. Підтримує та розвиває свої професійні навички, беручи участь у практичних семінарах оркестрового диригування на базі Саскатунського симфонічного оркестру. На питання про те, що допомогло їй успішно інтегруватися, Андрея посміхається: «Мабуть те, що я, за своєю натурою, оптиміст. Ніколи не варто падати духом або опускати рук. Моя життєва настанова — це віра в те, що всі мрії досяжні. Якщо не сьогодні, тоді на це просто потрібно більше часу». В перспективі Андрея збирається захистити свій магістерський рівень, продовживши навчання у University of Saskatchewan та зайнятися викладацькою роботою при музичній кафедрі. Імміграція, як каталізатор, допомагає Андреї відкрити свій потенціал і знаходити шляхи його застосування. «Я зрозуміла те, що якщо б я не іммігрувала, то, мабуть, багато речей ніколи не зробила б...», — ділиться вона.

Settlement and integration – success stories. Ukrainian newcomers share their experience in settlement and integration, what helped them make the transition to Saskatchewan, and how they're doing today.

■ Ірина Мацюк вперше приїхала до Саскатуну у відрядження як перекладач у березні 2005 року. Цілком випадково вона відвідала фестиваль українського танцю і була приємно здивована тим, як в Канаді шанують українські традиції. Місцева громада також створила позитивне враження, оскільки люди були привітні та доброзичливі. Окрім цього, Ірина звер-

нула увагу на те, що люди з середньою зарплатнею мають достатньо забезпечене життя і це, на її думку, робить Канаду привабливою країною для іммігрантів.

Живучи в Україні, Ірина досягнула певного кар'єрного зросту і пропозицію переїхати до Канади по роботі сприйняла як професійний виклик, оскільки потрібно було відкрити представництво в іншій країні, з невідомим їй на той час законодавством. Переїхавши на постійно до Саскатуну 2011 року, Ірина досить швидко залучилася до громадської діяльності. Протягом декількох років була однією з організаторів міського свята «Український День у Парку», де познайомилась з багатьма людьми, які в подальшому стали її друзями. Згодом увійшла до ради директорів Конгресу Українців Канади міста Саскатун, а наразі входить до ради КУК у Саскачевані. Усі ці функції вона виконує на волонтерських засадах. Опираючись на власний досвід, Ірина радить новоприбулим не замикатися в собі, а знайомитися з новими людьми та розширювати коло своїх друзів: «Місто Саскатун — багатокультурне місто. Тут відбувається безліч заходів, в яких можна взяти участь у якості волонтера та дізнатись чимало цікавого як про українську, так і про інші

Добре організована робота, збалансоване життя дали змогу Ірині разом з подругою Еммою Нагайло створити цікавий та успішний бізнес-проект Ukie Boutique — онлайн крамниця сучасного одягу в українському стилі. «Народжена на західній Україні у радянські часи, а потім навчаючись у Києві, я не вбирала вишитих сорочок, — каже Ірина, — а тут не можу уявити себе без вишиванки. Я рада, що є частиною української діаспори і горджуся своїм корінням».

Говорячи про освіту, Ірина зазначила, що має два ступені магістра з лінгвістики та маркетингу від українських вишів, а також дипломи з відзнакою від канадських Grant MacEwan University, де вивчала ділове адміністрування та Ashton College, де закінчила курс імміграційного консультанта. На цьому вона не збирається зупинятись і планує надалі вчитись та розширювати свій діапазон знань та навичок.

Сьогодні Ірина Мацюк — сертифікований консультант з питань імміграції. Її життєвим кредо є: *Hard work pays off,* тобто «Якщо людина працює, вона може добитись успіху незалежно від того, звідки вона походить», — стверджує Ірина.

■ Родина Андрусяків мешкає у містечку Уолзлі, що неподалік Реджайни. Андрій прибув до Канади 15 років тому. Перед імміграцією до Канади прожив 11 років у Сполучених Штатах. Олена працює учителем в Prairie Valley School Division. «Можу пишатися тим, що для здобуття сертифікату вчителя у Саскачевані мені потрібно було добрати лише 2 предмети за бакалаврат для того, щоб зрівняти академічну різницю, каже Олена. — Предметів з магістратури не добирала, адже мала їх навіть більше, ніж вимагали провінційні та федеральні вимоги. Дякую рідному Вінницькому педагогічному! I, звичайно ж, повинна була скласти мовний іспит IELTS на 7 рівень, як педагог з-закордону. Заохочую усіх перевірити свої дипломи у відповідних організаціях. Можливо ви зможете отримати еквівалент диплому чи сертифікат у вашій галузі», — радить вона.

Андрій з Оленою беруть активну участь в організації та проведенні таких заходів, як змагання на човнах Чумаки Regina Dragon Boat Team, зустріч Нового Року в українському стилі, уроки Рідної Школи, дитячі табори. Олена входить до Комітету Рідного Шкільництва при УНО Канади та до Освітньої ради Конгресу Українців Канади. На питання що є секретом його успіху, Андрій відповідає: «Треба закочувати рукави і працювати: хто головою, а хто руками. Канада — це країна можливостей, тому той хто працює — той заробляє і, відповідно, живе краще, а також отримує задоволення від того, що робить. Кожна хвиля іммігрантів додає свою

частку до розбудови української громади у Канаді, а різноманітність її діяльності має бути більш функціональною. Наприклад, мистецькі колективи зберігають традиції, і це дуже добре, але мусимо подбати про духовність, — каже він. — Гадаю, що церква повинна нести цю місію. А от громадські організації, такі як Конгрес Українців Канади, повинні допомогти громаді об'єднатися».

На питання про своє життєве кредо, Олена впевнено відповідає: «Бути оптимістом і позитивною людиною. Жити тут і тепер. Цінувати і мудро використовувати кожну мить. Дякувати людям». А щодо побажань новоприбулим іммігрантам, вона радить: «Ніколи не зупиняйтеся, навіть коли дуже важко. Рухайтесь вперед. Навіть якщо це два кроки вперед і один назад. Прийміть Канаду за ваш дім. Бережіть спогади з України і цінуйте можливості, які дає Канада. Живіть майбутнім. Настане хвилина, коли ви оглянетеся назад і зрозумієте, який довгий шлях ви пройшли. Повірте, ця хвилина настане швидше, ніж ви очікуєте. Ви зможете!»

Досвід майже кожного іммігранта складається з випробувань, культурного шоку, пошуку самореалізації. Зрозуміло, що в кожного своя дорога і перешкоди на ній різні, але важливо те, як ми сприймаємо труднощі та як їх долаємо на шляху до успіху.

Дякуємо українській двомовній школі ім. Владики Філевича у Саскатуні за надане приміщення та технічне оснащення для проведення семінару.



Workshop for Translators and Interpreters

In concert with its local branches and member organizations, the Ukrainian Canadian Congress of Saskatchewan has been assisting in the settlement and integration of Ukrainian immigrants to Saskatchewan for a number of years. Providing document translation and interpretation services is an important part in this process.

In the past eight years, UCC Saskatchewan has sponsored eleven workshops for prospective translators and interpreters. Many workshop participants later accepted translation and/or interpretation assignments from us and received remuneration for their services.



On November 10, 2018, UCC Saskatchewan sponsored a workshop for individuals interested in translation and/or interpretation work.

One section of the workshop was dedicated to an introduction to translation and interpretation theory and practice. Participants learned about translation and interpretation distinctions, ethics, tips and techniques, and practical experience in both.


A second section, for individuals who already had attended the introductory workshop in previous years, was dedicated to practical experience in oral interpretations of legal and police situations.

Ukrainian Catholic Eparchy of Saskatoon Inaugurates Annual Multi-faith Celebration of Prayer and Action to Protect Creation

The Ukrainian Catholic Eparchy of Saskatoon hosted an inaugural Season of Creation Akathist Prayer Service on the evening of September 19, 2018. The event took place in Saskatoon at Steve Patola Park/Treaty 6 Territory, where guest panellists from multi-faith affiliations were greeted with traditional Cree and Ukrainian customs.

While Season of Creation was a multi-faith event, everyone held one idea in common: Gratitude for the gift of God's Creation. The Earth is dynamic and full of potential. In a whole galaxy of stars, planets, and other astronomical wonders, Earth alone has the ability to sustain our lives. The wonder of creation promotes awe and amazement in those who study it. Indeed, it's the beauty of creation that inspires us to reflect on our Creator.

With this gratitude in the people's hearts, the event continued with the Akathist Prayer of Thanksgiving in Praise for God's Creation. Protopresbyter Gregory Petrov composed the Akathist Prayer shortly before his death in a Soviet prison camp in 1940.

This Akathist prayer praises God for many aspects of creation. In it we thank God for our existence, for love of family and friends, and every moment of life. The prayer continues with praising God for the flowers and fruits of the Earth, for light and for water, and for all creatures. These ideas are paralleled with our gratitude for salvation—that God uses our lives for His glory, that He reveals Himself to us, and for our hope of eternal life.

The beauty of the Akathist service carried in the voices chanting this prayer. Even those from other faith traditions, who were unfamiliar with the Akathist form, picked up the tones quickly, as candles flickered in the light of the crisp autumn evening, well-fitting the theme of Season of Creation.

After the Akathist service, people gathered indoors at St. George's Seniors Centre for the program presentation. Dr. Lesya Sabada introduced guest speaker Robert White.

White spoke about Richard St. Barbe Baker, an alumnus of the University of Saskatchewan. Baker worked in the forestry industry in the first half of the 20th century, and his legacy of planting trees and uniting communities inspires people even today. He and the people he inspired planted millions of trees throughout the world.

A panel presentation followed, consisting of fifteen panellists representing various branches of Christian and inter-faith communities, with each representative speaking for approximately three minutes. The Christian communities represented were Ukrainian Catholic, Syro-Malabar, Evangelical Orthodox, Roman

Catholic, Knox United, Mennonite Church of Canada, Presbyterian, Lutheran, Anglican and Doukhobour. Panellists from other faiths represented Unitarians, Hindus, Sunni Muslims, Bahá'ís and Tibetan Buddhists.

Most panellists began with a prayer from their tradition related to creation. The prayer was followed by an explanation if done in a language other than English—Russian, Hindi, Arabic, and Tibetan were among the languages represented. All panellists also gave a short explanation of how creation was important in their tradition, and what their community was doing to care for creation.

At the end of the panel discussion, Sabada invited Dr. Chris Hrynkow, a university professor from St. Thomas More College at the University of Saskatchewan to speak about a related initiative. Hrynkow introduced a local

affiliate group for the interfaith organization "Faith and the Common Good" called Communities Inspired for Environmental Action.

"We want to find ways to motivate and foster common action to care for our common home in ways that make sense in Central Saskatchewan but also draw on the insights circulating the national network of which we are part: Faith and the Common Good," he explained.

Closing remarks were given by Dr. Lesya Sabada, Coordinator for the Eparchial Human and Environmental Development Program. Sabada discussed her understanding of the sciences showing that the state of the environment is in crisis and encouraged an urgent response. She lamented that science is not deterring human activities that destroy life on the planet. She continued by stating that over

the millennia, many different religious traditions have developed, and they carry the same message: the message of love. Sabada believes it is these traditions that are capable of motivating and inspiring change. At the end of her remarks, Sabada encouraged us to make a commitment and give back to all God's children a world of beauty and wonder.
