CROSSROADS OF SONG Ukrainian Canadians have a story to tell. Like storytelling minstrels of old, the Canadian Bandurist Capella lets its voices and the strings of the bandura bring the rich musical story of Ukrainian Canadians to life.

As a not-for-profit corporation, the Capella is continually working to promote and popularize the bandura within the Ukrainian-Canadian community and beyond. The ensemble is committed to advancing and exploring new possibilities for choral-bandura music while honouring the instrument's deep history. As an individual and an organization, we must ask ourselves: as our society continues to evolve, how do we acknowledge and celebrate our cultural identity and support Ukraine to-day? Along with my fellow board members and the staff of UCC Saskatchewan, I look forward to interacting with the UCC membership to explore this question, and others, as we guide UCC Saskatchewan to realize its vision and mandate.

My wife, Christina, and I have made Yorkton our home for the past 30 years where we have raised our son and daughter. Registration Open for XXVI National Triennial Congress

The Ukrainian Canadian Congress (National) welcomes you to join us for the XXVI Triennial Congress taking place in Ottawa November 1-3, 2019. The Triennial Congress of Ukrainian Canadians is the highest decision-making body of the Ukrainian community in Canada. The Congress will set the agenda and priorities for the Ukrainian community for the next three years. Early bird registration deadline is June 30. Details at congress.ucc.ca.



UCC Saskatchewan held its 2019 Annual General Meeting and Board Elections on Saturday, March 2, 2019 at the Saskatoon Inn. President Mary Ann Trischuk welcomed 30 delegates and presenters from communities across Saskatchewan to the one-day meeting.

During the morning, a series of information sessions, facilitated by Executive Director Danylo Puderak, took place in a talk-show format. Danylo began by reading UCC Saskatchewan's Treaty Acknowledgement, adopted as part of UCC Saskatchewan's Diversity Strategy process.

"We acknowledge that we are on Treaty Territory and the Homeland of the Métis. Like the bound wheat Didukh that carries the spirit of our ancestors, we pay our respect to the Ukrainian pioneers, a founding settler people of Canada—our parents and grandparents and ancestors—who, for generations, have made this land our home. We pay our respect to the First Nation and Métis ancestors of this place and we reaffirm our relationship with all peoples for whom Canada is home."

The first session commemorated the Centenary of the Eaton Internment Camp and Canada's First National Internment Operations (1914-1920). Through the magic of Skype, delegates were able to hear a presentation by award-winning filmmaker Ryan Boyko from his current

home in Hamilton, ON, and then discuss activities, resources and funding opportunities with the Program Manager of the Canadian First World War Interment Recognition Fund Andrea Malysh from her office in Vernon, BC.

EATON 100

UCC Saskatchewan Executive Director Danylo Puderak provided background information on Canada's First World War Internment Operations (1914-1920) and the Eaton Internment Camp, built 100 years ago just southwest of Saskatoon. Many Canadian residents of Ukrainian and other origins were deemed "enemy aliens" and interned in one of the 24 internment camps established across Canada. Thousands more were obliged to carry identification documents and report to the police regularly, and faced additional restrictions on their basic civil liberties. These individuals suffered indignities not because of any wrongdoing on their part, but because of the passports they carried. Danylo pointed out that, in violation of their individual rights, internees were used as slave labour during the war and for two years after it had ended.

From February 25 to March 21, 1919, 65 internees, mainly German and Ukrainian men who had been forcibly relocated from the camp at Munson, AB, were held at the Eaton site, located on the grounds

of what is now the Saskatchewan Railway Museum, until they were transported to more secure facilities in Nova Scotia.

While having existed for only 24 days, the Eaton Internment Camp remains an important site of national historic significance due to its status as the only First World War Internment Operations camp to have existed in Saskatchewan.

Attendees then viewed the Munson and Eaton camp episodes from The Camps, an award-winning educational film series by Ryan Boyko, to learn more about these internment camp locations.

UCC Saskatchewan Special Projects Coordinator Jennifer Fedun spoke about the Eaton Internment Site Memorial Garden. Through the joint effort of four project partners—UCC Saskatchewan, Saskatchewan German Council, Prairie Centre for the Study of Ukrainian Heritage (PCUH) and Saskatchewan Railway Museum—a multilingual memorial plaque detailing the history of the site and park-style bench were installed with a grant from the Canadian First World War Internment Recognition Fund to complement the Fortitude monument erected by PCUH in 2004.

Jennifer said the memorial garden "is meant to be reflective and historically honest about the truth of this place" and that Eaton has the potential to serve as a "knowledge gateway" through which visitors can enter and discover the often

unknown realties of Canada's unjust treatment of the "enemy alien."

"It is our hope that Eaton will be an enduring educational resource and engaging permanent display promoting awareness of Canada's First National Internment Operations," she said.

Danylo then introduced The Camps producer and director, Ryan Boyko of Armistice Films, who made his presentation via Skype from Hamilton. Ryan spoke about the films series, which was created both to raise awareness about Canada's First World War Internment Operations and to provide a means of self-education on the subject.

He also related that his inspiration to tell the story on Ukrainian internment came after seeing the documentary "Freedom Had a Price" as a teenager. To learn more, he had asked his high school history teacher about the Ukrainian internment during WWI, but was shocked to hear the reply, "That never happened."

Ryan produced his own documentary on the topic of internment and named it "That Never Happened." The awardwinning film features interviews with descendants of survivors.

Ryan stressed that the issues of human rights, immigration and responsibility to one another as human beings are as topical now as they were a century ago.

Concluding the Eaton 100 session was Andrea Malysh, program manager of the Canadian First World War Internment Recognition Fund, who made her presentation via Skype from Vernon, BC. She gave an overview of the fund, established just over 10 years ago, and its objectives. Andrea said that it provided support mostly for com-

memorations for the first five years, and has since begun to fund an increasing number of educational initiatives, including curriculum development and conferences.

The Internment Recognition Fund is connecting with museums, the Canadian Museum of History being one, which plan to feature permanent exhibits on Canada's first national internment operations of 1914-1920. In the works is an exhibit of artefacts uncovered at internment sites, for example, a shovel used to dig escape tunnels and a cross fashioned from barbed wire.

Andrea described recently completed projects supported by the fund. Ryan Boyko's "That Never Happened" and Sandra Semchuk's book, *The Stories Were Not Told*, are examples of oral history projects, providing a means for internees and descendants to tell their stories and for Canadians to find out who these people were.

On a personal note, Andrea shared that it was through work at the fund—not from family members—that she learned how her grandparents' possessions were confiscated and they were forced to do manual labour as internees.

"They were afraid and ashamed to talk about it," she said.

To wrap up, Andrea listed examples of supported activity currently in progress, including a project involving the faculty and staff at Brandon University building an interactive virtual reality exploration of a WWI internment camp in Brandon.

"You'll be able to walk into the internment camp and hear men talk, and to pick up artefacts," she said.

The VR experience is to take 5 to 10 minutes, depending on the participant.

UCC SASKATCHEWAN ACTIVITY REPORTS

A series of information sessions with UCC Saskatchewan staff, committee members and representatives followed and explored the activities that UCC Saskatchewan is currently engaged in.

• Hromada Legacy Fund (HLF) Program

Community Outreach Officer Yuriy Kirushok described the funding categories and subcategories under which projects may receive a grant. He compared grant disbursement totals in 2017 and 2018 as well as the number of funded activities and the breakdown by geographical area. Yuriy then spoke about the upcoming Provincial 50/50 Lottery and explained how it is an important funding source for the HLF and how, in turn, the HLF supports UCC Saskatchewan's partner branches that sell tickets.

• Building Welcoming Communities

UCC Saskatchewan Immigration Settlement Advisors Olena Atamanchuk and Serhij Koroliuk cited statistics on recent Ukrainian immigration to the province and provided a description of the scope of their activity. Types of services offered to clients include: facilitating immediate settlement needs; assisting with everyday living issues; identifying community services and facilitating referrals; and, providing information on rights and responsibilities in Canada.

Olena and Serhij described their clients as being newcomers who arrived in Saskatchewan within the last two years and who are either permanent residents/immigrants or temporary residents. Although most clients come from Ukraine, the Settlement Advisors also provide services to clients who come from many other countries. →

UCC SASKATCHEWAN 2019 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Clients are served from the UCC Saskatchewan office as well as the Newcomer Information Centre in Saskatoon, where the Settlement Advisors work four times per month.

In addition, Olena and Serhij regularly provide informational resources and communicate with clients through Visnyk, e-Bulletin and the Settlement Advisors electronic circular, i-merezha.

UCC Saskatchewan Translation & Interpretation Services Assistant Coordinator Iryna Kozyna talked about how providing translation and interpretation services is an important part of the settlement and integration process. Most translated documents are legal and educational, with some medical as well, and interpretation services are provided mainly in court and, on occasion, at apprenticeship exams.

Iryna explained that in order to meet client request demands, the Coordinator recruits, prepares and manages a pool of translators and interpreters who are engaged to complete translation and interpretation assignments. A handbook of policies, standards, guidelines and procedures, which is updated and maintained by the Coordinator, provides the framework for the service.

UCC Saskatchewan engages Saskatch-

ewan-based individuals who have completed a professional development workshop delivered by the Coordinator. Danylo Puderak added that UCC Saskatchewan is currently in the process of creating a more formalized Professional Development Curriculum and Certificate Program so that individuals may become accredited translators and interpreters.

• Honouring Our Leaders, Cultural Practitioners, Innovators, Volunteers and Members

Chair of the Standing Committee on Recognitions Lissa Gruza stated that many individuals have been recognized over the years, but expressed concern that many worthy nominees are not being identified.

"The individuals in our communities—the initiators, the supporters, the 'lifeblood' of the activities that we take for granted-need to be recognized," she said.

Part of the Committee's activity in 2018 was the commissioning of a new Nation Builders award. This one-of-a-kind signature art piece/award was created on coloured baroque stained glass in the shape of the province of Saskatchewan. The baroque swirls in the Saskatchewan province glass plate represent Saskatchewan's living

skies, its flowing rivers and the sway of the wheat fields, while the top/pysanka symbolizes the beautiful sunsets.


The media used for this creation are actual pieces of real pysanka eggs which includes a half pysanka egg with emphasis of wheat motifs representing Ukrainian Halychanka wheat. The top centre of the award also has a top of a pysanka egg representing the sun/sun-setting form.

The award attempts to capture unique elements as described in the objective of the award that include the traditional Ukrainian Pysanka, fields of Halychanka/ Canadian Red Fife wheat, and historic Ukrainian churches built by Ukrainian immigrants settling in Saskatchewan.

The dark brown and black matting and frame represent Ukraine's rich chornozem soil and, to some extent, the rich soil in Saskatchewan.

Reminding attendees that the nomination deadline is May 1, Danylo Puderak encouraged them "to nominate those people to say 'thank you' for their contributions." Of his favourite program, he said, "It is inspiring and one learns a lot about the honourees."

It was noted that the 2019 awards presentation will take place in Regina two



Найщиріші побажання з радісними та благослевенними Великодніми святами! weeks earlier this year on Sunday, October 20 to accommodate the Triennial Congress of Ukrainian Canadians being held in Ottawa the first weekend of November.

Lissa Gruza then thanked the UCC Saskatchewan staff and committee members for their work, and called upon all those present to encourage the nomination of individuals from their communities.

• Holodomor Awareness & Education

Danylo Puderak introduced Nadia Prokopchuk, member of UCC Saskatchewan's Standing Committee on Holodomor Awareness & Education. Nadia said that the committee's job is to educate about a "dark chapter of our history as Ukrainians" and despite being temporarily without a Chair, the committee is still moving forward with its wide-ranging activity. Recent and current activity includes ensuring teachers have resources via the Saskatchewan Teachers Federation; running Holodomor awareness features and ads in major and regional newspapers; co-hosting a provincial commemorative event at the Legislative Building in Regina.

Nadia gave highlights about her participation in the 85th International Holodomor Forum and Commemoration in Kyiv, describing the event as emotional and memorable. Please see her article in the winter 2018 issue of *Visnyk*.

She also spoke about the Holodomor Chapter for the online Voices Into Action resource, currently in English and French, and soon to also be in Ukrainian. Nadia described the documents and materials used in creating the Holodomor Chapter and left them on display for perusal.

Nadia said that activity in 2019 includes helping coordinate the Saskatchewan leg of the Holodomor Mobile Classroom Tour starting April 29 and a symbolic project for elementary school students to plant kernels of grain.

"The approach will focus on wheat, Saskatchewan and food—how Ukrainians were instrumental in bringing wheat to the province," she said.

Nadia mentioned that Valentina Kuryliw, author of the recently published teaching resource *Holodomor in Ukraine, the Genocidal Famine 1932-1933*, will be keynote speaker at the Social Studies Saskatchewan conference in Moose Jaw this October. Valentina will talk about her book and gift copies for school libraries. Also, a book launch for this resource is planned for the fall in Saskatoon.

Danylo Puderak remarked that the committee remains active and commended its members for their dedication to the task of educating youth about the Holodomor Ukrainian Famine Genocide.


• Our Community University Representatives Danylo Puderak introduced John Rozdilsky, UCC Saskatchewan's representative on the University of Saskatchewan Senate, who began a two-year term last July. John reports to the UCC Saskatchewan Board of Directors.

Since being appointed, he attended his first and only meeting thus far last October. Remarking on the work of his predecessor, he said, "Nadia Prokopchuk has done our community proud in how she has contributed to the Senate."

John acquainted the audience with the three governing bodies at the U of S. While the Board of Governors oversees and directs administrative matters and the Council is responsible for academic affairs, the Senate gives various public stakeholders a voice in University affairs.

He noted, "Besides the French, Ukrainians represent the only ethno-cultural group that has a place at the table."

As one of its responsibilities, the Senate reviews scholarships at the U of S. \rightarrow

John talked about the goal of better promoting those scholarships that deal with Ukrainian issues. Danylo Puderak added that the Senate is responsible for the granting of honorary degrees, another aspect that could be promoted in the Saskatchewan Ukrainian community.

While introducing U of S Ukrainian Students' Association interim President Mykan Zlipko, Danylo Puderak said that joining such an association has a long-term social and cultural impact on students, who, together with alumni, become strong supporters of Ukrainian studies at the university. He asked Mykan to share with attendees the situation with the 2019 Spring Session in Ukraine Program.

Mykan described how senior administration at St. Thomas More College had cancelled this year's program for reasons related to risk management and safety protocol. However, the 2019 Spring Session was reinstated after lobbying by the USUSA, a significant development given that the Spring Session gives six credit units towards a Minor in Ukrainian Studies at the U of S.

Mykan stated that USUSA has 40 members led by a 12-member executive. Currently the largest in Canada, the club

focuses on promoting Ukrainian culture and academic programs, and holding events in the community (e.g., Holodomor vigil). She said that members will be travelling to Winnipeg for the SUSK conference in May.

Although no Ukrainian studies program exists at the University of Regina,

President of the U of R Ukrainian Students' Association Kiegan Lloyd reported that the club holds Ukrainian cultural events and fundraisers during the academic year (e.g., pysanka workshop and bake sales). Additional activity is presently focused on establishing long-term goals for the club and strategic planning.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

• Organizational Business

Delegates elected Nadia Prokopchuk as Chair of the proceedings and Fr. Patrick Powalinsky to serve as Secretary.

After the opening prayer and a moment of silence for departed members of the community, out-going President Mary Ann Trischuk presented her final annual report, briefly highlighting UCC Saskatchewan's wide-ranging activity and accomplishments during her two terms as President.

"It is important to acknowledge our funders: the Government of Saskatchewan – Ministry of Immigration and Career Training, SaskCulture and SaskLotteries and, of course, our donors and our corporate sponsors," she said.

Mary Ann extended a heartfelt thank-you to board members for sharing their expertise and strengths to enrich the Ukrainian community in Saskatchewan, and to staff members for their hard work and passion.

"You have helped our organization rise to a level of excellence that I am so proud of," she said.

Nadia thanked Mary Ann for putting her "heart and soul into this work for the last several years and making everything work with the juggling of family and other responsibilities. I think our community has been enriched in so many ways by your leadership."

Executive Director Danylo Puderak then presented the Treasurer's report on behalf of Treasurer Stephen Gabrush who was unable to attend due to another commitment.

Danylo noted that 2018 marked another strong financial year. Continuing to diversify its revenue sources, UCC Saskatchewan currently sits in a healthy financial position with record 2018 revenues of over \$569,000 and an excess in revenues of almost \$8,000. Moving forward, the Board will focus on developing tools to ensure long-term sustainability both financially and organizationally.

"In 2018, the Board of Directors established a reserve fund to safeguard the organization in case we experience a large loss in funding from one of our funders or major economic problems, or if, at some point, the board chose to invest into a major asset for the organization, for example, the purchase of a building," he said.

In his Executive Director's report, Danylo Puderak pointed out how "our province is changing and, along with it, so is our Saskatchewan Ukrainian community. And we need to embrace this change so that we can move forward as a strong community."

Danylo stated that UCC Saskatchewan continues to grow and "to seek new opportunities to better meet the needs of our community members." To conclude his report, he thanked out-going President Mary Ann Trischuk, UCC Saskatchewan Board members and staff.

After briefly describing his personal background and involvement in corporate and voluntary sectors, John Denysek said, "I promise to work closely with the fellow board members and staff to realize the outcomes in our recently developed strategic plan, which provides a road map for what the next five years will look like."

"Ongoing communication, input and feedback from all UCC Saskatchewan membership will be critical if this organization is to continue to flourish and, more importantly, that our Ukrainian identity is preserved, evolved and shared," he said.

Out-going Board members were then thanked for their service. Mary Ann Trischuk presented a gift of appreciation to Sonya Jahn who had served as Director at Large (2015-2016) and as Secretary (2016-2019).

This year, a staff long service award was presented to Community Outreach Officer Yuriy Kirushok for five years of service.

• Presentation of 5-Year Strategic Plan

The information sessions continued following the business portion of the day with the presentation on UCC Saskatchewan's Strategic Plan for 2019-2024. Executive Director Danylo Puderak and President John Denysek briefly described each of the eight stages of the strategic planning process that began in the spring of 2018.

Following a review of vision, mission, mandate and values statements, an environmental scan/organizational assessment, community consultations and review of a draft plan, five strategic priorities were adopted to guide UCC Saskatchewan for the next five years. They are:

- Enhance connectedness to cultural identity (focus on youth and those not involved)
- Newcomer outreach and engagement
- Increase visibility/engagement with membership
- Implement a comprehensive communications/marketing strategy

- Consult with branches regarding roles, responsibilities and where they fit
- Work with branches to build capacity and design tools to enhance effectiveness and connectedness

3. Building Long-Term Financial Security

- · Diversify revenues
- Develop successful fundraising program

4. Implement Authentic Diversity Plan

- Actively promote multiculturalism, interculturalism and diversity
- Be a partner in Truth and Reconciliation
- Be innovative and inclusive in what we do

5. Provide Dynamic Programs and Services

- Review and update current programs
- Seek out new opportunities to meet under-served needs, e.g. Ukrainian archives, cultural day-camps
- Build cultural capacity foster achievement, encourage professionalism and the acquisition of knowledge
- · Invest in our youth

Integration of Ukrainian Newcomers into Saskatchewan Communities

Most articles in this column, "Things Worth Knowing," deal with emerging issues that newcomers face as they adapt to a new country. But today, let's take a look at the topic of settlement from a different angle and hear directly from Ukrainian newcomers how they are integrating into Canadian society. In this article, we will examine three separate cases and identify what helped Ukrainian immigrants integrate. We trust that sharing these success stories will help you learn more about this new generation of Ukrainian immigrants, how they are adapting to life in our community and perhaps, for some of you, draw parallels to your own settlement experience.

ANDREYA KARNAUKH



Andreya Karnaukh immigrated to Canada (Saskatoon) with her family in 2006. Originally from Ukraine, she studied at the Lviv State Conservatory in the faculty of Choir and Opera and Symphonic Conducting.

"The first two years in Canada were

very difficult," Andreya recalls. "Two small children, loneliness, not knowing the language... So, at first, I focused on studying English. My husband worked while I took our sons with me to English language classes at the Saskatoon Open Door Society. My children were looked after while I was in the classroom. Then I got a job—initially, with the Ukrainian Canadian Congress of Saskatchewan, and then at Bishop Filevich Ukrainian Bilingual School and Georges Vanier Catholic Fine Arts School in Saskatoon."

Andreya is the founder and artistic director of the children's choir, "Spivohrai." She is also the founder of the vocal quartet, "Oremus," where she performs, along with husband Mykola, spiritual works of the Baroque period. She maintains and develops her professional skills by participating in conducting workshops organized by the Saskatchewan Orchestral Association.

In response to the question about what helped her successfully integrate, Andreya smiles.

"I think it's my optimistic nature. Never give up! I believe that all dreams are achievable. If not today, then it's just a matter of time."

Andreya is planning to defend her Master's degree at the University of Saskatchewan and eventually get a teaching position at the music department. Immigration, like a catalyst, helped Andreya discover her talents and find ways to use them.

"I realized that if I hadn't immigrated, probably, many things never would have happened..."

IRYNA MATSIUK



Iryna moved to Saskatoon from Kyiv, Ukraine in 2011 and quickly became involved in community activities. For several years, she was one of the organizers of Saskatoon's "Ukrainian Day in the Park," where she became acquainted with many people who soon became her friends. Later, she joined the board of directors of the Saskatoon branch of the Ukrainian Canadian Congress.

"The city of Saskatoon is a multicultural city. There are many events in which one can take part as a volunteer and learn a lot of interesting things about the Ukrainian and other cultures."

Well-organized work and a balanced life allowed Iryna, along with her friend, Emma Nahaylo, to establish their successful business project, "Ukie Boutique," an online store of modern, Ukrainian-style clothing.

"Born in Ukraine during Soviet times, I did not dress in traditional Ukrainian embroidered blouses," she says, "and here, in Canada, I cannot imagine myself without a 'Vyshyvanka' (embroidered shirt). I am happy to be part of the Ukrainian Diaspora and proud of my roots." →

He is a general contractor and the owner of Kozak Custom Carpentry, which offers construction services. Andriy's wife, Olena, is a teacher at Prairie Valley School Division.

"I take pride in the fact that for my Saskatchewan's teacher's certificate, I had to get only two baccalaureate subjects in order to evaluate the academic difference," says Olena, "and, of course, the IELTS language test at level 7 as a foreign-language teacher. I encourage everyone to assess their diplomas in regulatory organizations in Canada. You may be able to get the equivalent of a diploma or certificate in your profession/field," she advises.

Andriy and Olena are actively involved in organizing and conducting events such as the competing of the Chumaky team in the Regina Dragon Boat Festival, Ukrainian language classes, and children's camps.

Speaking of the secret to his success, Andriy states, "You have to roll up your sleeves and get to work, whether it's with your head, or with your hands. Canada is a country of opportunity, so whoever works will earn their living and also get pleasure from what they do. Each wave of immigrants adds to the development of the communities in Canada."

When asked about her life motto, Olena replies with confidence.

"Optimism and a positive attitude," she says. "Live in the here and now. Appreciate every moment and spend it wisely. Thank people."

She offers the following advice to newcomers: "Don't give up, even when it's very difficult. Move forward. Accept Canada as your home. Keep the memories from your past life in Ukraine and appreciate the opportunities that Canada gives. Work towards the future. Soon, you'll look back and realize how far you have gone. Believe me, this moment will come sooner than you expect. You can do it!"

Most newcomers will experience trials, tribulations (hardships), culture shock, and the search for self-realization. It is important that we learn how to respond to such difficulties and to overcome them on the path to success.

Individuals Worth Celebrating, Stories Worth Telling

We have been blessed with many individuals who have made important contributions to our Saskatchewan Ukrainian community, as well as

to various spheres of life on a provincial, national and international scale. Back in 1995, the Ukrainian Canadian Congress of Saskatchewan decided to take the lead in recognizing prominent Saskatchewan Ukrainians and established a recognitions program, which was enhanced in 2005 with the addition of the Community Recognition Award.

Each year, up to 10 individuals are honoured with either Nation Builders or Community Recognition Awards. Since inception, 256 individuals have been recognized through UCC Saskatchewan's official Recognitions Program.

Biographies of these people impress with the broad scope of activities that our community members have undertaken over the years. Fine examples of achievement and dedication are the life stories of Community Recognition Award honourees **Natalia (Wasylyk) Maruschak** and **Natalya Shevchuk**, whom I interviewed recently.

■ NATALIA MARUSCHAK (Community Recognition Award for Cultural Preservation and Development 2017) from Alvena has been faithfully committed to serving the Ukrainian community. Her love of the Ukrainian culture, combined with her passion for writing, led to the publishing of "A Little Girl Remembers" in KRAÏNA: My Canada, a collaboration with her artist daughter, Lesia Maruschak. It is also evident in her role as a reporter for the Wakaw Recorder, covering Ukrainian cultural topics and events in the Alvena area for over 50 years.

YK: Pani Natalia, please tell me a little bit about yourself? What inspires you to work towards the preservation and development of Ukrainian culture?

NM: What started around the farm kitchen table, with a coal oil lamp, a Ukrainian Reader, and the teachings of my parents, Anna Kapitan and Wasyl Wasylyk, led to me spending a lifetime documenting, preserving and sharing the Ukrainian cultural identity with family, community and the world beyond. My parents, who came to Canada during the second wave of immigration, were part of a society that worked on the railway, developed the land, and built churches. My family was part of a community that displayed courage and

determination, and worked to maintain that community through volunteerism, fundraisers and a giving spirit. So, to nurture that legacy, I had to take a lead with respect to volunteerism and philanthropy.

YK: You were a Community Recognition Award recipient in 2017. Could you please share what your thoughts were when you learned about your selection? What is your overall impression of this recognitions program and its impact on the Saskatchewan Ukrainian community?

NM: I felt so honoured to be selected. As a first-generation Canadian, my first thoughts were of gratitude and humility. I immediately knew that in reality this award belonged to, and was shared with, so many people in my life who once held my hand and stood with me and all those who currently walk beside me in life's journey—all inspiring and nurturing my hopes and dreams in the continued preservation of Ukrainian culture, tradition, and history.

My selection sparked an enthusiasm to continue contributing, sharing and inspiring others to seek opportunities to honour and preserve our culture. One example was an invitation to speak at Ilarion Residence in Saskatoon on the occasion of International Women's Day 2018, where I spoke about the importance of recording and sharing one's life stories—the value of creating our legacy.

The Nation Builders and Community Recognitions Awards is an excellent program. It allows us to recognize self-less individuals who dedicate themselves to preserving and sharing our heritage, culture and traditions. As well, it brings awareness and encourages others to get involved and contribute in a leadership role in their communities and organizations to create legacy projects.

■ NATALYA SHEVCHUK, originally from Battleford, is currently a University of Saskatchewan student. In 2016, when she received a Community Recognition Award for Youth Achievement, 17-year-old Natalya was recognized for her active involvement in community life and leadership: in 2015, she organized the "Dancers Who Care" campaign to help raise funds for a new facility for Battlefords citizens with cognitive challenges; she worked on initiatives to stop litter, canvassed for various charities, and volunteered with St. John the Baptist Ukrainian Orthodox Church. Natalya also studied Ballet, Tap, Jazz, Lyrical and Pointe, and danced with the Svoboda Dancers of North Battleford and the Pavlychenko Folklorique Ensemble of Saskatoon.

I asked Natalya to reflect on being recognized with the award and share what she has been up to since receiving it.

NS: It was really an honour to be selected. I think it is a way of life for a Ukrainian to help out, so the fact that UCC Saskatchewan actually selects people to award, and was able to recognize me for doing something for the community is really awesome. It was such a big event for us: we got to be showered with love from our Ukrainian community, and it was so big

and fancy. It was really cool to see so much planned for us and that people wanted to take care of us.

I graduated high school in 2017 as valedictorian of my class, and I toured Ukraine with the Pavlychenko Folklorique Ensemble in the summer of 2017. Then, I moved to Ukraine for 10 months to study Ukrainian dance, culture, language, and traditions; it was the most amazing experience of my life. In 2018, I was lucky enough to be a mentee of the SaskTanets program. I volunteered for the SaskTanets Summer workshop and got to work on a regional information booklet for the camp. I got to be mentored by camp instructors Lana and Andriy, and I learned more, so now I am able to be a dance instructor.

YK: Are you still involved in volunteering and other community work? How would you describe your current engagement in community life, in particular, Ukrainian community life?

NS: Moving first to Ukraine and then to Saskatoon, I have not been able to work on some of the things I did while in high school, but some of the projects I started are still going on. For instance, in 2017,

I created a project in Battleford called "Blessing Box," so people can donate items and take what they want, if they are in need

My involvement in Ukrainian community life is centred at the moment on the dancing part of it. I am currently a dancer with Pavlychenko, and I teach at Rushnychok, Saskatoon School of Dance, and Wakaw Ukrainian Dance. So, I teach at three different places now, trying to keep those traditions alive in our community.

These two individuals give us just a glimpse into the wealth of talents and the commitment to community that our Saskatchewan Ukrainians demonstrate. Recognizing our volunteers and leaders is very important. They deserve a special thank-you, and their stories and legacy need to be shared.

Would there be enough support for this new cultural idea? So many questions.

Well, flash forward 45 years and you have the answer to all those questions, and that answer is Vesna Festival 2019.

On May 11th Vesna Festival will be held at Prairieland Park Hall A. It will bring together some of the most beloved performers in Saskatchewan. The Yevshan Ukrainian Folk Ballet Ensemble has been a mainstay at Vesna Festival over the years. With the vibrancy, skill

New Lesson for Students Featured in Mobile Classroom

Starting April 2019, the Holodomor National Awareness Tour (HNAT) will begin its western tour of Canada, visiting schools and engaging students on board the Holodomor Mobile Classroom (HMC).

Beginning in Victoria, BC and travelling eastward, the HMC will be in Saskatchewan on April 29th for a three-week period.

"We are excited and looking forward to our trip to Saskatchewan this spring. The warm hospitality from our past visits is part of the excitement, but what's more exciting is the second lesson we have for students, called 'Breaking The Sound Barrier: Raising Voices Out of Silence (BTSB);" said Roma Dzerowicz, Executive Director of HNAT.







"This lesson is very different to our first lesson, which is based on the Historian's Craft. This lesson creates an immersive and interactive learning experience through the perspective of courageous people who wrote truthfully about the Holodomor, teaching students that their voice matters."

For the last three years, the HMC has travelled over 50,000 miles from coast to coast across Canada, engaging high school students, educators and the general public. Book Review

This is more than a historical book about Canada's First World War internment camps. While it does inform readers why thousands of immigrants to Canada, mostly Ukrainians, were designated as enemy aliens and imprisoned, it is also designed to encourage us to reflect on the broader implications of the humiliation of being mistrusted, and the lessons for us today.

Interspersed with the text are images of archival documents and pictures, as well as Semchuk's own contemporary photos of commemorative events, and the sites where the camps once stood. The rusted remains of a bucket and spade surrounded by lichen and autumn leaves at Spirit Lake tell as poignant a story as the personal recollections.

The section of stories from internees and descendants, though, is the heart of the The Stories Were Not Told: Canada's First World War Internment Camps by Sandra Semchuk University of Alberta Press; 312 pages; ISBN 978-1-77212-378-4; \$34.99



book. Only about 50 pages long, it should not, however, be read quickly. Each story deserves the reader's full attention, and when the story reads like a transcript of a recording, it is an invitation to imagine oneself in the presence of the teller.

"My father tried to get ahold of international laws regarding prisoners of war and tried to use what he learned in some way," says Anne Sadelain, daughter of Vasyl Doskoch, who was interned at Morrissey, Mara Lake, and Vernon, BC, and Kapuskasing, ON.

"He became a real anathema for the guards. He was often punished. Sometimes that would be by cutting his food rations. Or, sometimes, he would be put into the black hole, where they would get bread and water."

Semchuk says, "The landscapes of our memories shape us." She also believes that telling our own stories and being heard supports the reclamation of identity across generations.

"I stand as a witness to my family's past," says Valdine Ciwka, whose grandfather, Petro Witrowicz, was interned at Kapuskasing.

"I am proud to be the granddaughter of a Ukrainian immigrant. He was not a criminal. He was persecuted for being who he was, a worker and an immigrant. By chance of birth and circumstance, he was forced to spend two and a half years of his life paying for this crime."

Beyond the communities affected by the internment operations in the First World War, Semchuk's first person musings also touch on the subsequent internment of Japanese Canadians and the dislocation of First Nations.

"There is a duty for society to see how we participate in the creation of systemic inequalities and racism, to lessen the burden on those victimized, and to recognize that entitlement is a root problem," says Semchuk. B
